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Dr. Simon teaches courses on criminal law, criminal justice, risk and the law, and socio-legal studies. His scholarship concerns the role of criminal justice and punishment in modern societies, insurance and other contemporary practices of governing risk, and the intellectual history of law and the social sciences.

Dr. Simon is the author of *Poor Discipline: Parole and the Social Control of the Underclass, 1890-1990* (1993) and the co-editor of *Embracing Risk: The Changing Culture of Insurance and Responsibility* (with Tom Baker, 2002) and *Cultural Analysis, Cultural Studies, and the Law: Moving Beyond Legal Realism* (with Austin Sarat, 2003). His most recent book is *Governing through Crime: How the War on Crime Transformed American Democracy and Created a Culture of Fear* (2007).

Dr. Simon also serves as Co-Editor of *Punishment & Society* and Associate Editor of *Law & Society Review*. He received his J.D. and Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley.
