ABOUT THE PRESENTER

Daniel S. Nagin is Teresa and H. John Heinz III University Professor of Public Policy and Statistics at Carnegie Mellon University. He received his Ph.D. in 1976 from what is now the Heinz School. Nagin has participated in two MacArthur Foundation Networks—the Network on Adolescent Development and Juvenile Justice and the Network on Economic Inequality and Social Interactions. He is on the editorial board of six journals, and served on numerous national committees and advisory boards and served as Deputy Secretary for Fiscal Policy and Analysis in the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue from 1981 to 1986. Nagin is an elected Fellow of the American Society of Criminology and of the American Society for the Advancement of Science.

His research focuses on the evolution of criminal and antisocial behaviors over the life course, the deterrent effect of criminal and non-criminal penalties on illegal behaviors, and the development of statistical methods for analyzing longitudinal data. His work has appeared in such diverse outlets as the **American Economic Review, American Sociological Review, Journal of the American Statistical Association, American Journal of Sociology, Archives of General Psychiatry, Criminology, Child Development, Psychological Methodology, Law & Society Review, Crime and Justice Annual Review, Operations Research, and Stanford Law Review**. He is also the author of **Group-based Modeling of Development** (Harvard University Press, 2005)
