THE STATUS OF WOMEN IN MOROCCO

Moderator: Rahma Bourqia, President Hassan II University – Mohammedia-Casablanca

Dr. Bourqia, President of Hassan II University in Mohammedia, Morocco, is the first woman to be appointed to the presidency of a Moroccan university. Throughout her professional career, she has been active in educational reform and the changing of gender roles. Bourqia was appointed by Morocco's King as a member of the committee created to discuss the status of women in Morocco, which led to the 2004 New Family Law which changed the legal status of women in her country. Since 1977 she has worked in the education field holding positions from philosophy teacher at the secondary level to professor of sociology in the Department of Sociology at Mohamed V University. In 1998 she was named dean of the School of Literature and Social Sciences at Hassan II University, and held that position until 2002 when she was named president of the university. She is also the first woman in Morocco to be nominated as a member of the Moroccan Royal Academy. Dr. Bourqia has conducted extensive research on a variety of issues specifically in the areas of urban and rural sociology; political sociology, social and cultural anthropology of the Middle East; gender studies; medical anthropology; and sociology of education.
