5. GENDER STUDIES AREA ELECTIVES

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15 credits

Students select five electives from Gender Studies-designated courses and may substitute a semester-long internship in a gender-related field or an approved Independent Study with a GS faculty (GEN 389 or 489) for one elective. To ensure that students are exposed to significant and significantly different approaches to thinking about gender and sexuality, students **must take at least two courses in each** of the two categories. <u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> these categories have recently changed.
