WHAT WILL YOU LEARN IN THIS MAJOR?

Anthropology is the study of people and their cultures across the world. For undergraduates it provides unique and important knowledge and skills for professional success in culturally diverse work environments. Students learn about the different ways people think and act in life with respect to love, food, family, religion, work, sexuality, safety, communication, their relationship to the environment and its resources and the law among vastly different peoples and cultures across the globe. Anthropology students gain understanding of the ways that politics shape the economy and the economy shapes politics as well as how legal systems manage social life and the Earth's biodiversity and distribution of natural resources. We focus our study of culture on issues of crime, inequality, diversity, and justice as it is broadly conceived in all human activities.

Students in this major have a chance to get first-hand experience in urban ethnography, a way to study people by participating in and observing their lives. Anthropology majors develop their own research and collaborate with professors who have made amazing cultural explorations: accompanying police raids in Brazil's favelas; decoding storefront signs for inclusion and exclusion in gentrifying Brooklyn; following Palestinians from the West Bank to Israeli prisons; producing and directing student-playwrights' plays about sexualized violence for large audiences; engaging in democratization programs in former Soviet states through law enforcement trainings on domestic violence; charting changes in the testimony of gender-based violence survivors as they are processed by the sociolegal system; critiquing educational systems for exclusion with the aim of developing inclusive educational processes that prioritize equality in student outcomes; comparing gendered, racial and economic violence and people's creative responses to them as well as anti-racist movements across Latin America; examining the roles that coastal communities, fishers, nongovernmental organizations and scientists play in shaping ocean governance and marine resource management.

Understand global processes and local politics affecting modern cities, migration, ethnic conflict, religious diversity, activism, and lifestyle differences

Learn to write for particular audiences.

Gain real experience and job skills of observation, documentation and analysis needed for today's "information society" job market.
