Dear Academic Affairs Colleagues,

Each of us commits many small, individual efforts such as writing feedback on student work or inputting EHRAFs with the hope of some larger outcome — an individual student's intellectual growth or ensuring the human supports students need to thrive in college are in place to begin with.

In my role I focus far more on the macro than I ever used to. To be effective I investigate trends, figuring out what we can do, say, to increase our graduation rate by even 1%. If I don't care about such small increments, I'm letting 22 individuals who start with us as freshmen down. Would you fail half a class or allow a colleague to go unpaid? Of course not. Everything we do matters. That's why I was proud to share in testimony to City Council last week how John Jay has increased the numbers of students graduating significantly in the last ten years. It is also why I had to admit that with a 6-year graduation rate of 53% I am not satisfied. We have a lot more work to do to serve our students as well as we can. I know I'm not alone in caring and trying – that's what makes the John Jay community so inspiring.

Provost Testifies on John Jay Graduation Rates to City Council

Last week the New York City Council Committee on Higher Education held an oversight meeting on graduation rates at CUNY campuses. I was asked to testify alongside Sarah Truelsch, CUNY Assistant Dean for Policy Research, and Christine Brongniart, University Director for CUNY ASAP/ACE.

John Jay was the featured college because we have a great story to tell. We have innovated and worked hard to increase the numbers of students completing their degrees (see attached testimony). But when Councilmember Dinowitz asked point blank if we were okay with our graduation rates, I had to tell the truth. As proud as I am of our incredible work to help more student achieve their dreams, it is still not okay that almost 1 out of every 2 students who starts with us does not complete their bachelor's degree.

I hope you'll join me in committing to supporting more students to complete their education in our next strategic plan.
