CUNY announced on Friday that of its \$500,000 AI Innovation Fund, John Jay had won \$133,116 for six unique projects. Research Consultants Interview Faculty and Administrators to Support John Jay Research

Support for higher education research is changing and we are ready to confront this challenge. John Jay is participating in an Intensive Cohort engagement through the National Organization of Research Development Professionals (NORDP) Consultants Program to receive tailored, expert guidance on advancing our research strategy and research development infrastructure. Last week the consultants assigned to John Jay for two years (Carol Thornber and Barbara Endemaño Walker) visited John Jay and met with leadership, faculty, and center directors as well as OAR staff to focus on our research direction, priorities, and feasibility. The NORDP Consultants Program, administered through Emory University and supported by the National Science Foundation (NSF), provides research development services to institutions at no cost to the institution. Its purpose is to grow research capacity, competitiveness, and sustainability at Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs) and Emerging Research Institutions (ERIs) by connecting them with experienced research development professionals.

***Let's AI Together* Engages 70 Staff, Faculty & Students In Day-Long Discussion**

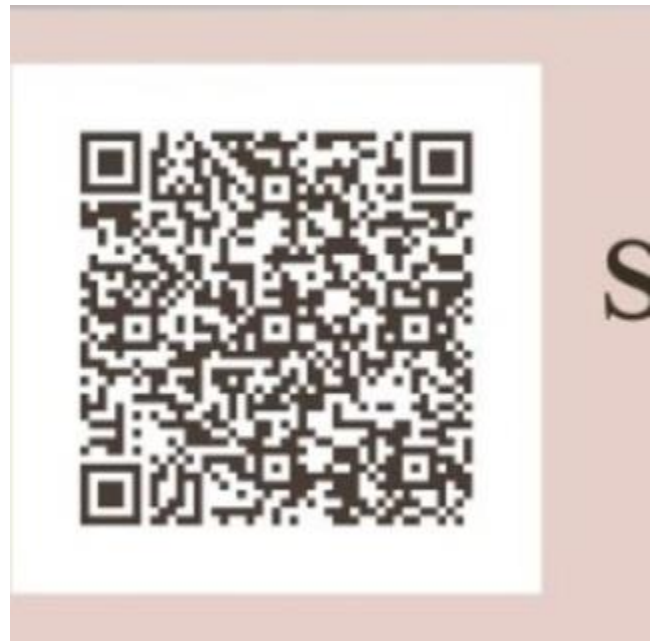
