B. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR SENIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM

Minimum GPA- 2.0 overall

Courses are considered individually and only those courses for which the student has received a grade of "C" or better are transferable. While transfer credit is not granted for a grade of "D", students may be excused from repeating required courses in which they received a "D." In selecting courses at County College of Morris students must select courses according to the equivalency table found below.

John Jay College will accept up to 68 credits from CCM towards fulfillment of the bachelor's degree.

E. ARTICULATION AGREEMENT FOLLOW-UP PROCEDURES

1. Procedures for reviewing, updating, modifying or terminating agreement:

College County of Morris faculty and John Jay College faculty will review and analyze the strength of the curriculum and the success of students on an annual basis as part of their annual assessment activities. Modifications will be made as required.

Changes

Neither party may change this agreement unilaterally. Proposed changes in policies or curricula by either party must be communicated in writing to the other party and agreed upon in consultation with relevant officials, including faculty, of each institution. Any changes agreed upon must be signed, dated, and attached to this agreement.

Notice of Cancellation

Either party may independently cancel this agreement by notifying the other party no less than one academic year before the intended date of cancellation.

2. Procedures for evaluating agreement, i.e., tracking the number of students who transfer under the articulation agreement and their success:

The CUNY Institutional Research Database will be used to track performance (in terms of credit accumulation and GPA) and persistence (in terms of retention and graduation) of all CCM students who transfer to CUNY Senior Colleges.

3. Sending and receiving college procedures for publicizing agreement, e.g., college catalogs, transfer adviser, websites, etc.:


